## Writing Major Scales

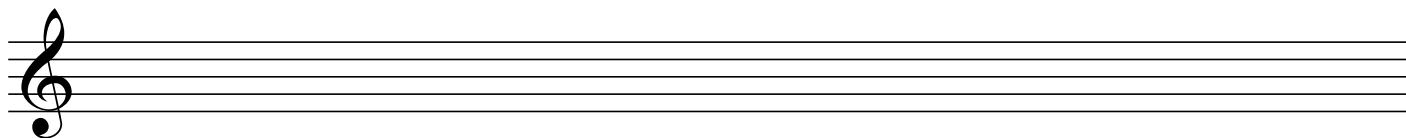

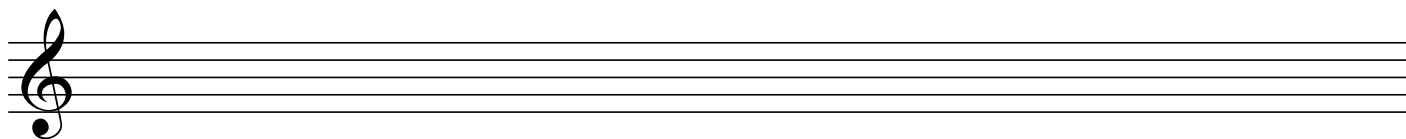

1. Write each scale degree in the spaces under the staff.



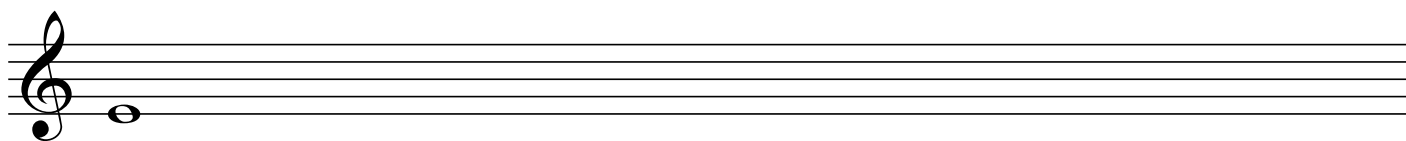
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2. Write each scale degree and the whole steps and half steps that occur between them.



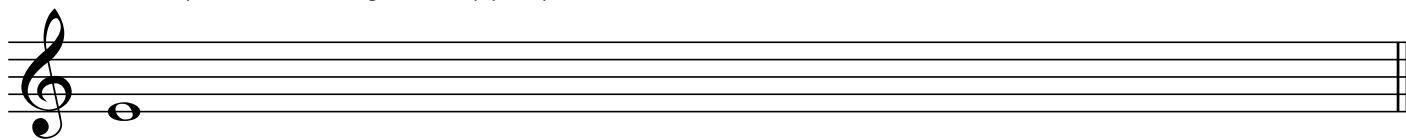
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3. Write each scale degree and the whole steps and half steps that occur between them, and write an E diatonic scale, starting with the pitch shown in the staff below.
